


100-People Village


The United Nations defined poverty as









WATER

Convention on the Right of the Child (CRC)

Children are most vulnerable in underprivileged situations. To promote and protect children's human rights, the United Nations has since adopted CRC was in 1989. It is the first legally binding international instrument incorporating the full range of human rights for children. It articulates the full complement of civil, political, cultural, social and economic rights for all children.

Currently, 196 countries have ratified CRC. By ratifying this Convention, governments worldwide are committed to securing and ensuring children's rights, as well as to shoulder relevant responsibilities.











